Museum 2025 report

On behalf of the museum team, I would like to thank the Association for their continued support, both as advocates in the wider community and as a valued sources of advice and information.

It has been a busy and exciting year so far for the museum, continuing the third year of Arts Council NPO funded projects, engaging with thousands of school children and welcoming visitors to a varied exhibition and events programme.

Visitor numbers to date: 24,901 (As of 24th November 2025)

Income to date £31,841 (April – October 2025)

Plus £150,000 NPO funding and £28258 other external grant funding

Exhibitions

2025 is the 200th anniversary of the naming of Iguanodon, a dinosaur important to Hastings, and **Stories from DEEP TIME** was a response by SoCo Artists to this and the museum's geological collection. Eighteen artists explored themes including an investigation into the collectors of fossils, the places where fossils are found and the fossils themselves.

In May 2025, **Agatha Christie – the Queen of Crime** opened at the museum. Another popular show displaying Gale Goddard's unique collection and explored the life and legacy of author Agatha Christie, spotlighting her iconic characters and works. Spanning 1920–1933, exhibits included detailed displays like Poirot's dinner setting on the Orient Express, Christie's 1926 disappearance, and Egyptian artefacts linking to Death on the Nile.

Since August, the Long Gallery has hosted **Plants Make Places** - This multidisciplinary exhibition features artworks by artist and environmentalist Laura Ribbons, as well as work created in partnership with local communities, exploring how art can be used to illuminate and negotiate the climate crisis. Laura's work celebrated the strength and Mythology of plants, constituting a continued dialogue around ideas of survival, hope and wellbeing. Discover how plants and green spaces can both shape our experience of place and belonging and inspire a recognition of our deep need for connection with other species.

Beside the Sea – JJ Waller

14th February 2026 – 5th April 2026

Besides the Sea features photographs by local Sussex artist JJ Waller. The show will present a selection of images taken in Hastings & St Leonards, as well as the towns of Blackpool, Brighton & Benidorm. JJ Waller's playful 'beyond the picture postcard' documentary photographs celebrate seaside tourism in a fun, vibrant, and engaging style. This exhibition explores quintessential British seaside scenes in conversation with global shots, delving into the complexities of coastal tourism and its unique quirks.

Lemons, Laws and Secret Doors: Hastings Queer Underground

25th April – 30th August 2026

This exhibition will illuminate hidden LGBTQIA+ histories, exploring what being LGBTQIA+ in Hastings has meant across time — from the town's development boom in the 1850s and the people it attracted, to pre-WW2 moments of queer visibility (such as drag and parties), through the AIDS crisis, and finally to the visible, vibrant community we see today. The exhibition will feature objects, artwork, oral histories, and archival research pertaining to Lesbian Lives (1850-1920), uncovering the lives of early queer women and suffragette networks; Hidden Loves (1850 – 1967), exploring local queer existence and relationships before partial decriminalization; Community Organizing (1968 – 2025), charting activism, peer support and local LGBTQIA+ groups; The Aids Crisis (1980 – 2000), documenting stories of loss, care, and resilience – and the backdrop of Thatcherism and Section 28; and Hastings Now (2000 – 2025), capturing contemporary queer life and culture.

Calland's work explores the intersections of gender, ecology, and popular culture. Drawing inspiration from the vibrant poster and magazine culture of the 1970s and 80s, their work

reimagines these forms to celebrate contemporary trans and non-binary creators on TikTok, capturing the gender-affirmative joyfulness found in their videos.

Schools and Learning

The Museum's Schools and Learning offer has gone from strength to strength this year. 4121 school children have engaged with the museum learning offer between April and November 2025 and as well as delivering curriculum focussed workshops, the team have been collaborating with environmental artist Laura Ribbons, using the museum collection to explore the profound impact of plants on our sense of place, hope, and community in the face of the climate crisis, with a particular focus on Hastings.

As well as developing, planning and delivering workshops and materials for schools, the learning team have been leading on a partnership project Fixing Our Broken Planet – funded by the Natural History Museum. This project includes collections research, youth engagement, co-curation methods with young people and developing new interpretation for our mineral collections that will culminate in an exhibition display as well as a heritage trail around Hastings

Volunteers

Since April 2025, our volunteers have completed 841.5 hours of volunteering including auditing the displays in the Upper Durbar Hall, facilitating researchers and collections documentation and care. Thank you so much to our volunteers, who continue to be a great support to the museum and the staff.

Building

NPO

One of the main NPO funded events this year was Market at the Museum which took place on 5 July. The event attracted an estimated 1,250 visitors to the museum throughout the course of the day. Despite the poor weather, there was a very positive atmosphere, and visitors seemed to have a great time. The free transportation was well used, which was an excellent result as it suggests that one of the primary aims of the event – bringing in new audiences from areas that typically do not utilise the museum or other venues and services available in the town centre – was achieved.

Four Trainees have been hosted by the museum this year, all receiving training in an introduction to collection care and conservation, marketing, interpretation and label-making, object handling, object research and documentation, curation, photography, and public programme development, alongside Collections research.. The initial two trainees focussed on the collection and exploring ways of engaging and identifying stories particularly relevant to the Ore area. The trainees have developed digitisation skills creating 3D models of archaeology excavated in Hastings which will be presented through an online map plotting these discoveries in the locations they were found. This resource will be hosted on the museum website as part of the Digital Museum.

The latest two trainees have conducted independent research to activate part of the Collection on permanent display in the Upper Durbar Hall. They have added interpretation panels in both English and Arabic for two objects on display (Italian Maiolica Dish with Hunting Scenes, Tin-glazed earthenware, Italy, 16th century and Ceremonial Shield – A Story of Power and Culture, Iran, early 19th century – in Mughal style, Brassey Collection), as well as the Upper Durbar Hall gallery and Grey Owl Gallery. They have also curated a temporary display of two objects in the Upper Durbar Hall to introduce audiences to the history of the objects and how they reflect their own personal stories.

Home Education groups are designing an intervention for the Natural History Gallery to focus on the impact of climate change and humans on natural environments.
